It will focus on writing as a process and supported by attention to writing conventions of spelling, grammar, punctuation, and capitalization. Students prepare, present, and view speeches for a variety of purposes.

**<u>COURSE SUMMARY</u>**: English 8 is divided into separate courses to provide students with instruction in reading, writing, speaking, listening, and viewing. Students read about a variety of topics from a wide range of genres including an autobiography from a Holocaust survivor and classic novels. They participate in small groups to discuss content and complete projects but also work independently. Students use the writing process to compose formal essays and pieces of creative writing. Lessons over grammar, spelling, and punctuation are incorporated with writing instruction and focus on the specific needs of each student.
